

Lomandra species

Lomandra has proven to be a popular landscape plant, respected and used by landscape architects and horticulturalists alike, for its resilience and consistency of form. When incorporated as framework plants, either in formal settings or in revegetation projects, they consistently perform their amenity and ecological roles, with minimal follow up maintenance requirements. They also establish with ease from either seedlings or transplanted mature plants.

Propagation

Propagation is straight-forward without the need of pre-treatment of seed apart from soaking overnight. Sow into any good potting mix or light loam. Keep the media moist but not damp. Prick out seedlings into individual tubes at about 5cm and grow on as desired.

It succeeds in most soils and aspects in Australian gardens, also tolerating occasional flooding but does not like heavy clay soil. It withstands temperatures down to at least -7°C. Position in heavy shade to full sun in a moist position.
